As we move through the seasons this year, let's never take God's great gifts for granted. Each season has its own spectacular offerings. Each season bears profound witness to the power of God.



## **Education and Interpretation,** *Marie Samec, Education & Interpretation Mission Co-ordinator*

#### Where our Money Goes,

A series of articles is planned to examine where our United Women in Faith (<u>UWF</u>) money goes, the sources of funding, and the programs and services provided. Our pledges and other gifts help support local missions (pages 12-13 in our 2024 Yearbook) and contribute to work around the globe on behalf of women, children, and youth. I hope to highlight some areas for you.

**UWF scholarships** create opportunities through education for women, helping change lives and build future leaders. The <u>National</u> Scholarship is for lay women in the USA who are pursuing careers in church or social service vocations. Preference is given to laity working on behalf of women, children, and youth. UWF's own general secretary and CEO,

Sally Vonner, received a scholarship while attending Perkins School of Theology. The <u>International</u> Mission Scholarship Program was designed to enable women and youth from *outside* the United States to receive leadership development opportunities to strengthen their contribution to the betterment of society.

In 2022, approximately 192 scholarships were awarded to students in the United States and around the world, totaling over \$410,000. Within that total (as of August 2022), slightly more than \$85,000 was given to 16 students who attended Africa University in Zimbabwe. Africa University is the first and only fully accredited institution of higher learning established on the African continent by action of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church in 1988.

### Labyrinths

The existence of labyrinths date far back into antiquity and they have been constructed throughout the world in Christian and non-Christian settings. According to the Labyrinth Society, a labyrinth is a meandering path, usually circular in struc-



ture, which may be used for many purposes, often for meditation, dancing, church functions-- the very space and setting is believed to stimulate right-brain activity.

According to the Rev. Dr. Jill K. H. Geoffrion, Ph.D, an authority on labyrinths, "A labyrinth can be a wonderful outreach and hospitality tool that communicates the warm, open spirit of a church. Having a labyrinth that is available to the larger community is a wonderful way of welcoming the public onto the church property or into the building. Sharing this sacred tool communicates the congregation's interest in the spiritual health of its members and neighborhood."

Signage directing people (Trinity members and non-members) to the Labyrinth is a significant part of this project. As a result, it is believed that Trinity's Labyrinth will be a form of outreach to the community, connecting people to the sights, sounds and the peace of its natural setting. It also will provide a comfortable contemplative space for prayer to Trinity members.

Several years ago, members of Trinity's United Women in Faith were exploring a way to memorialize several of our departed members after receiving gifts in memory from their families. It was hoped that these gifts could be used to create a permanent remembrance which might serve the community as well. The idea of a labyrinth was proposed. After consultation with the senior ministers, a small committee of three people (Jim Cook, Ann Abbott, and Sandy Kramer) implemented the labyrinth project. Since its initiation, four other members have joined the team: Jim Nilon, Keith Doty, Stan Beckerdite, and Susan Jones. While the UWF was able to provide a portion of the necessary financial means to supplement this project, a large proportion of the required capital was donated privately by church members, without affecting the overall church budget.

Construction of Trinity's Labyrinth is being overseen by Bryce Burger, Landscape Architect from Gainesville, who also has family ties to Trinity. Phase 1, which has been completed, involved the design and layout of the path of the Labyrinth. The pavers forming the path have been laid to be ADA compliant. At the center of the Labyrinth will be Trinity's Triquetra, the symbol of our church. Phase 2, now underway, will be the creation of signage directing people to the Labyrinth, as well as the construction of four granite benches dedicated to the UWF members whose memorial gifts inspired the construction of the Labyrinth at its inception. Phase 3 will address landscaping.

You will find this path situated to the south of the church sanctuary, near the memorial garden. The front pond is clearly visible nearby combining scenic beauty with the audibly tranquil sounds of flowing water provided by the pond's lovely fountain. Please check out the Labyrinth and enjoy this project initiated by your own United Women in Faith. *Elaine Robinson and Ann Abbott*

**Phyllis Darnell** was a woman of action, a woman I would term as "grit and grace"! Phyllis was responsible for many of our events such as Coffee Connection, Dorcas, and lunch for Trinity's staff. She was a faithful woman of God. The work she initiated in Dorcas continues today in the making of prayer shawls and other "care" items for the church family and the community. Phyllis served as President of the Trinity Unit in 2002 -03 and was awarded the unit Special Mission Recognition in 2001.

**Cheryl Foltz** will always be remembered for her quiet, dedicated mission to the fiscal health of Trinity's UMW. She was a woman of strength, dignity, and with a delightful sense of humor. Cheryl was a true sister in Christ! For numerous years, Cheryl and John prepared the annual Program Book for the Trinity unit. She received the unit Special Mission Recognition in 1981.

**Priscilla Pridgen** was truly a woman of God. She was so faithful in her mission of giving through her music, her work for the Florida Youth Ranch, and her commitment to (at that time) United Methodist Women. Priscilla was an inspiration to many women. She served as unit President in 1968-70 and received a Special Mission Recognition in 1979.

Three benches on the labyrinth pathway will be dedicated to these women. The benches are there for a moment of prayer and/or reflection as you travel the labyrinth path.
